#### Message From The Pastor: The Mirror

Of all the inventions that man has made over the fabric of time probably one of the most important or at least in the top 10 to 20 is the mirror. You find mirrors almost everywhere you go and as people walk by them, they almost always stop and look at themselves for different amounts of time. There are good things about mirrors and there are bad things about mirrors. The main problem with the mirror that everyone doesn't want to admit is that the mirror always tells the truth. If you have a few more gray hairs – the mirror won't be shy about telling you. If you have bags under your eyes – the mirror will show you them in all their glory. If you have gained some weight – the mirror doesn't beat around the bush and shows you the truth. The mirror does not cover up our defects and will tell us that we are better looking than we really are. In reality, the closer you get to a mirror, the more it will reveal the truth about what we are really like.

I am reminded of the story Robert Fulghum tells about one of his professors, a wise man named Alexander Papaderos. At the last session on the last morning of a two-week seminar on Greek culture, Dr. Papaderos turned and made the ritual gesture – "Are there any questions?" These two weeks had generated enough questions for a lifetime, but for now, there was only silence. "No questions?" Papaderos swept the room with his eyes. So, I asked. "Dr. Papaderos, what is the meaning of life?" The usual laughter followed, and people stirred to go. Papaderos held up his hand and stilled the room and looked at me for a long time, asking with his eyes if I was serious and seeing from my eyes that I was.

"I will answer your question." Taking his wallet out of his hip pocket, he fished into a leather billfold and brought out a very small round mirror, about the size of a quarter. And he said something like this:

"When I was a small child, during the war, we were very poor, and we lived in a remote village. One day, on the road, I found the broken pieces of a mirror. A German motorcycle has been wrecked in that place. I tried to find all the pieces and put them together, but it was not possible, so I kept only the largest piece. This one. And by scratching it on a stone, I made it round. I began to play with it as a toy and became fascinated by the fact that I could reflect light into dark places where the sun would never shine – in deep holes and crevices and dark closets. It became a game for me to get light into the most inaccessible places I could find.

"I kept the little mirror, and as I went about my growing up, I would take it out in idle moments and continue the challenge of the game. As I became a man, I grew to understand that this was not just a child's game but a metaphor for what I might do with my life. I came to understand that I am not the light or the source of the light. But light – truth, understanding, knowledge – is there, and it will only shine in many dark places if I reflect it. I am a fragment of a mirror whose whole design and shape I do not know. Nevertheless, with what I have I can reflect light into the dark places of this world – into the black places in the hearts of men – and change some things in some people. Perhaps others may see and do likewise. That is what I am about. This is the meaning of life."

And he took his small mirror and, holding it carefully, caught the bright rays of daylight streaming through the window and reflected them on my face and onto my hands folded on the desk.

The Bible is like a mirror because when we look at it and read the Gospel of Jesus Christ, we see ourselves for who we really are. We are sinners who have defied God and deserve eternal judgement from a Holy God. Like a mirror that reflects light that is shone on it, the Bible reflects the true light of Christ because it says in Romans 6:23 (NLT), "For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life through Christ Jesus our Lord." Through God's grace and mercy, we can humbly come to Christ, truly repent of our sins, cry out to Him as Lord and Savior and be saved (Romans 10:9-13). In John 9:5 Jesus says, "I am the light of the world" and as his disciples we are to be like a little mirror reflecting the light of Jesus in a dark world.

As we allow the Holy Spirit to transform us into the image of Christ, I want to leave you with 5 helpful prayers:

God, give me wisdom, knowledge, and understanding.

God, let any knowledge I gain serve to help me love You and others more, and not puff me up.

God, help me see something new about You I've never seen before.

God, correct any lies I believe about You or anything I misunderstand.

God, direct my steps according to Your Word.

My brothers and sisters in Christ, I pray that you allow the Holy Spirit to transform you day after day and as we look at the mirror each day, we won't see us, we will start to see Jesus. As it says in Matthew 5:16, "In the same way, let your good deeds shine out for all to see, so that everyone will praise your heavenly Father."
